#### **NAPLAN 2023**

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a point in time assessment of literacy and numeracy skills. Each year students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in tests for writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

From 2023, NAPLAN is moving to Term 1 and will take place from Wednesday 15 March to Monday 27 March. The reason for this change is so that results can be returned to schools earlier in the year which will support teachers to understand the learning needs of their students and plan accordingly.

NAPLAN tests are just one part of our school learning assessment program and questions are primarily based on knowledge, understanding and skills gained from the prior year of schooling.

In preparation for NAPLAN 2023, our school will undertake activities to help students to become familiar with the format and functionality of the online tests. These activities are not an assessment of student ability and will not be marked.

Students and parents can access the public demonstration site - click here - (https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site) to familiarise themselves with NAPLAN and the types of questions and tools available. Excessive preparation for NAPLAN is not required nor recommended.

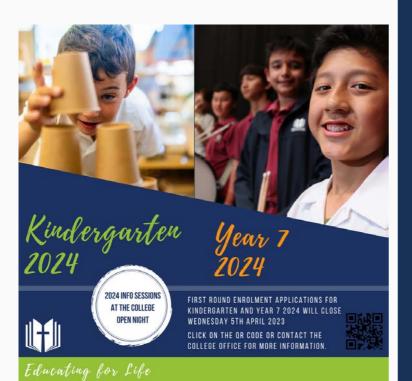


### STATE CHAMPION - ARCHERY

# TRANSITION TO HIGH SCHOOL:

kicking-off, not kicked-out.

High school has well and truly kicked-off for our Year 7's, but next week it gets real as they attend their 'kick-off' camp at Attunga. You'll find it in the beautiful Southern Highlands of NSW in a place called Canyonleigh.

Starting high school is one of the key milestones of any teenager's life. It's a thrilling phase that happens alongside other big changes. Teens experiencing this transition are shifting from having parents and home as their main focus. Their friends may now become the most important people in their life. Teens are also going from what is familiar to what is unknown which can result in resilience seemingly taking a back seat.

According to Dr. Justin Coulson, there isn't a magic solution to raising resilient teens. "One-on-one, parent-to-child is where the real work of the family is done. We build resilience in the minute-by-minute micro interactions we have with our children where we tap into their lives and shore up their confidence and feelings of worth" [1]. While it's good to give your teen the freedom to form their identity, to make new friends and to explore their interests, you still play a key role in helping them to navigate this phase.

"Attunga" is an aboriginal word that means 'High Place'. And it's up high that a lot of identity exploration, friendship-forging and limit-finding takes place. It may only be through the cheers of support of your mates that you find the courage to pull the rope from the tree-tops on the giant swing. Perhaps the confidence to fly through the tree-tops on the zip-line you only found through last night's authentic discussions with your peers. Could a new found love of horses be sparked on the hilltop escarpment?

While high-school has kicked-off for our teens, we as parents are not kicked out.

# COACHING YOUR CHILD THROUGH FRIENDSHIP DRAMA



### TRY TO FIX THE PROBLEM FOR THEM.

- "You need to stay away from them for a while."
- "I'm going to call their parents right now!"

# FORCE YOUR CHILD TO STAY WITH OR CHANGE FRIENDS.

- "You are not allowed to play with them anymore!"
- "You have been friends since 1st grade. You need to keep your friendship."

# ASSUME YOUR CHILD IS ALWAYS THE VICTIM.

- "You're always getting picked on."
- "You poor thing. You can't stand up for yourself because you're smaller."

### MINIMIZE HURTFUL COMMENTS.

- "I'm sure you two will be fine by tomorrow. You always make up."
- ♦ "Let it go. I'm sure they didn't mean it."

### BAD TALK THE FRIEND

- "I never liked you being friends with them!"
- "They have anger management issues they need to work out."



# LISTEN TO YOUR CHILD WITHOUT JUDGMENT AND GIVE YOUR FULL ATTENTION.

- "What happened?"
- "What do you think the problem is?"

# ASK OPEN-ENDED QUESTIONS TO LEARN MORE ABOUT THE SITUATION.

- ♦ "How did you feel when they said that?"
- "What bothered you the most about that situation?"

### SHOW EMPATHY.

- "That must have felt really hurtful when they called you that."
- "It must have been very hard to stay in class after that happened."

# ASK WHAT KIND OF HELP THEY NEED FROM YOU.

- ↑ "How can I support you right now?"
- ♦ "What do you need?"
- ↑ "I'm always here if you need my help."

### BRAINSTORM TOGETHER.

- "What are some options that you would be comfortable trying to deal with this?"
- \* "How do you think they would react if you tried doing that?"

Talk regularly about friendships. Use audio stories, books, social media, and your personal experiences as conversation starters to point out what good and healthy friendships do and do not look like.
